



The Face of Hunger: Mobility Challenges

Eric Gool, a Veteran and resident of the Freedom's Path community at Fort Harrison, often helps his neighbors with shopping and preparing meals. Many of the 63 residents at Freedom's Path are low-income Veterans, some with families, who either don't have transportation or the physical abilities to come to Helena Food Share when they need food support.

Jason Bridger, Peer Specialist at the VA Montana Healthcare System contacted Helena Food Share about helping Veterans that live on the campus who are unable to get into town for their basic food needs on a regular basis. "This has been a huge impact with getting our Veterans with transportation and income challenges, food that will help supplement their needs for the month," said Jason. Now, with monthly stops at Fort Harrison, the mobile pantry allows Eric to help his neighbors bag and box their food selections just outside their front door.

Other mobile pantry stops include the M.E. Anderson apartments in downtown Helena and Aspen Village on Helena's east side. Both locations currently have about 25 residents who are seniors or persons with disabilities that hamper their ability to access the Lewis Street or East Helena pantries.

Crates of staples, produce, meat and dairy products are loaded into the van, driven to one of the three locations, and parked outside where residents can easily access the food they need.

As with most issues surrounding food insecurity, the challenges people face to accessing food resources is multi-faceted. For many, physical or mental challenges make it hard to drive themselves or use public transportation. Others simply don't have the means to secure transportation.

Nola Freestone and Bob Levitan are two volunteers who have filled many roles at Helena Food Share through the years. This soft-spoken couple both find the work an important way to give back to their community. Giving back is just a part of who they are.

Nola, who also volunteers for the R.S.V.P. program in Helena, calls each senior customer in the Helena Food Share database every other month to remind them when it's time to pick up Senior Commodities, or when they can pick up their summer Farmers Market coupons. Not only important reminders, these calls are also a good opportunity to check in with senior customers and to share a welcome conversation.

Bob has volunteered at Helena Food Share for four years and has helped with almost every activity




in the pantry—stocking shelves, assisting customers, picking up grocery rescue items at local stores, distributing Kid Packs, and loading senior commodities. "My mom donated to Helena Food Share and instilled a sense of volunteerism in my family," shared Bob. "When I retired, I knew this would be a good place to volunteer as a way to give back to my community and to work with many of my friends who were already volunteering there."

Many other local organizations receive Bob's time and talents as well. Bob builds set designs for the Grand Street Theatre, clears trails for the Prickly Pear Land Trust and is a member of the Birdseye Volunteer Fire Department.

This past year, when staying home because of the pandemic, Nola used her sewing talents to create a beautiful family quilt out of her father's ties, all of which were made by her mother. She collected the ties after her parents passed away and decided the best way to keep them in the family was to sew the ties into a quilt to raffle off among family members. Nola completed the quilt this spring and held the raffle in June. One lucky family member got to take home the quilt and Nola and her family donated all the proceeds to Helena Food Share.

Helena Food Share and the wider Helena community are all the better for having Nola Freestone and Bob Levitan among us. "The satisfaction of the work and getting to know the customers in the pantry is a wonderful benefit of volunteering," said Bob. Nola added, "It feels good to be able to give back and help our neighbors."
