Donna came to shop at Helena Food Share on a blustery winter day when dark clouds threatened snow. As Donna was being helped out to her car with the groceries you provided, she made a comment about the cold. She said that the cold didn't bother her until she got cancer. Now, the cool winds and low temperatures re-

ally take their toll on her slight stature.

Speaking Donna with about the cancer, led to a conversation about the costs of

medicine. Like Donna, many Helena Food Share customers struggle with the costs of medicine. As these senior customers look at their expenses, one of the only places that they can see any potential for cutting costs is with their food budget. As medicines become priority number one, cutting back or skipping meals altogether are choices many face. Fortunately, you make it possible for seniors to fill that gap with healthy, nutritious food.

You are there for Donna, and many other seniors, with your support of Helena Food Share. On average Helena Food Share serves 525 seniors monthly through our Grocery Share. Annually, 2,190 Senior Commodity food boxes are distributed to low income senior citizens via our partnership with Rocky Mountain Development Council. Additionally, 302 seniors participated in the Helena Food Share and the Department of Health and Human Services Senior Farmers Market Coupon Program.
