Groceries to the Rescue

hen grocery shopping, do you ever wonder how items get to the stores or what happens to products not ultimately sold? At Helena Food Share, the food we share comes from a variety of sources, and our local stores play an especially important role.

Before last spring, the Helena community provided food through multiple food drives. Then, and more importantly today, your financial donations to Helena Food Share are used to purchase food items through a wide range of outlets. Food providers include local retail and wholesale outlets. Montana farmers and gardeners, the Montana Food Bank Network (both purchased and donated items), and donated commodities from the federal government. All of this accounts for approximately 60 percent of the food distributed through Helena Food Share programs.

The biggest single source, nearly 40 percent, is food donated from over a dozen businesses in the Helena area through Helena Food Share's Grocery Rescue program. Each location donates various products to Helena Food

Share because they know of the need in our community. So when they have excess, they gladly share with us. While it may be food that won't be sold, it's still good food.

Each day that Helena Food Share is open, grocery rescue staff and volunteers arrive early at the pantry, grab a cup of coffee, jump into a delivery truck and begin making the rounds of collecting food at 17 local stores.



On a typical morning, Dave and Leroy or Steve and Joe, head out to stores across the valley to gather items that will soon become available later that day for customers at one of our pantries. About an hour and a half into the morning and after stopping by 5-6 stores, the truck, filled with bakery goods, fruits and vegetables, milk, deli items, and assorted canned foods, heads back to the pantry where the drivers unload the truck. The crew then completes their rounds of all the other stores before calling it a morning.



With so many things in 2020, hosting a treasured community event safely presented a new challenge. For the past nine years, Helenans came to the Lewis & Clark Library the Friday before Thanksgiving with turkeys to share so their neighbors in need could enjoy a traditional holiday meal. However, the desire to keep people safe by following social distancing guidelines meant this would not be possible.

As a result, the 2020 Turkey Challenge became a virtual event. Rather than donating turkeys, this year's challenge moved to online donations with the goal of funding 2,500 turkeys and accompanying sides to provide a full holiday meal for anyone who could not otherwise put this type of meal on their table.

The camaraderie of generous friends stopping by the library to drop off turkeys was not a

part of this year's big day. Still, the excitement and energy of competitive turkey drives and watching donations add up throughout Friday created a new sense of community. Helena stepped up in record numbers and donated online to support their neighbors. They met our challenge goal by providing funds for over 2,500 meals.

Event sponsors Cochrane Insurance, Big Sky Acoustics, Montana Radio Company, KTVH/MTN, and the Lewis and Clark Library all played significant roles in the successful event. Their financial support, enthusiasm, creativity, and good work ensured the tenth annual Turkey Challenge was a triumph. The support of long-time business partners, including Capital Sports, Marks Lumber, Mediterranean Grill, Rock Hand Hardware, Tempest Technologies, and those hosting a virtual Turkey Challenge drive (see page 2), also made this a banner year.

Funding was just the first step in meeting the challenge in 2020. Safely sharing food with customers was the next critical piece. Customers selected pick-up times online. Then, a few days before the holidays, a turkey or ham, vegetables, stuffing, rolls, cranberries, and other meal essentials were boxed up and loaded into each customer's car.

Cards arrived shortly after with words of gratitude. One customer shared, "Thank you again for being there when I'm out of food. Every month I can count on you still being there. You care so much that I feel like giving back sometimes too. My heart and mind give you all the love one person can handle. May your holidays be happy and cheerful this year. I would shake your hand and give you a hug, but I can't, so it's the thought that counts."
